

Chamaerops (Arecaceae)



humilis

Origin: Mediterranean basin. Unique Palm native to Europe, which is almost always a broad bush made up of more than one stem of different sizes, divaricated and topped by a tuft of rigid fan-shaped leaves. The stems are covered in a brown fibre and what is left of the leaf stalks that have fallen or been cut off. It rarely occurs as single-stemmed. Evergreen leaves, palmate, almost round, pale green on the upper side, covered in a whitish down on the underside. The leaves are borne by long, green stalks tinged in purple, with thorns on the edges. Yellow flowers in dense panicles from spring to summer. Fruit: groups of elliptic, brown berries on the female plants. No special requirements regarding type of soil as long as it is not stagnant. Tolerant to maritime exposure. Grows well in pots or troughs.

humilis "Cerifera"

Very attractive selection of Chamaerops humilis whose leaves are covered in silvery down on both sides. Worth noting for its proven superior resistance to frost.







humilis "Vulcano"

Another new selection with darker green leaves and more compact habit. Ideal variety for balconies, terraces and rock gardens.
